

## PRESIDENT'S COLUMN

3086

Last year, Spring came to Canada Lake with a real roar. Lots of action, ice movement, wind and low water. This year, Spring just sort of sneaked in gradually. Good weather prevailed and the ice just gradually melted and disappeared. The water was pretty well up and remains so at this writing. All in all, the lake looks beautiful and is awaiting your arrival to make the picture complete.

We were all very sorry to learn of the recent passing of our good friend and director, Herb Steincamp. For years Herb has served our association on the board and as chairman of the Membership Committee, in which capacity both he and his good wife Helen have spent many many hours helping to bring the association to the state of strength which it now enjoys. His wisdom and counsel will be sorely missed. I am sure that all members join in offering Helen our sincerest sympathies in this time of great loss.

In view of the water problem at Caroga

Lake last summer, your directors last Labor Day undertook a precautionary check of the Canada Lake water. Done by Carl Ackerbauer of Ackerbauer Laboratories in Johnstown. results show that there is a degree of pollution in the lake water. The bacteria count in the large part of Canada and West Canada lakes is such that drinking the water would be unadviseable though not so high as to preclude swimming. One area, Sawdust Creek, did show a high count. Your directors have met with the town board regarding corrective measures inasmuch as the pollution is probably coming from trailers parked along the creek at Pine Lake. We expect that the town board will see to having this condition investigated and corrected by State personnel this summer.

Your directors have undertaken a program of self-help and correction including a series of checks through the summer by Ackerbauer, and checks by our own membership on the efficacy of our own water treatment systems, individually, using the same dye test which is used by the state people. The cooperation of all lake residents is urgently sought in implementing our self-testing program so that we may have the pure water originally provided by nature returned to the lake for the use and benefit of all.

All members are urged to be sure to attend the Annual Meeting at the school on July 12 where this matter will be taken up in greater detail. Meanwhile, kindly give the above your serious thought, and keep the whole thing within our membership family until the July 12 meeting. No need for panic thinking or action.

Note that the boat parade has been scheduled for a week earlier this year, with a rain date on the last weekend. As many members are busy with closing up on Labor Day Weekend, the thinking is that many more boats might participate on the 24th than would be available on the 31st. Let us try this change this year, subject to revision in the future if revision seems indicated.

Arden Zipp says he has definitely scheduled our fireworks display for the evening of July 3rd, and we will look for no last minute announcement of change. Incidentally, like everything else, the cost of fireworks has increased greatly in recent years. It seems that in 1969 we are still operating on the same yearly dues figure that we used in 1949 and before. The costs for fireworks (one of our best yearly events), a much-needed anti-pollution program, and other yearly needs seem to indicate the advisability of a modest adjustment in our dues figure. Considering what we spend on our own

summer's tun and entertainment, such an adjustment would not be killing for anyone and would enable your board of directors to provide better service to the benefit of all.

Al White is chairman of our Membership Committee this year. His phone number at the lake is published in the list of Directors here in the Echo. He will appreciate your help in bringing in new members both from among new residents and from among older residents who for some reason have not joined in previous years. Kindly call Al with names of new residents in camps near your own. The Membership job is a big one and needs all the assistance available.

Finally, in addition to enjoying our beautiful lake this summer, let's all get 100% behind our association, its board and its program this year and every year, for in unity there is strength, action and a better summer for us all. Be seeing you soon.



## THE TALK OF THE HOUSE by Edgar Moore

Fall. Lookin' around the lake makes one think of a big city goin' to sleep don't it? Lights has been goin' off till now there ain't hardly a camp with a light showin' and nary a sound. The laughin' kids, their moms and dads all gone to winter quarters just like them geese we see flyin' over today. I tell you young feller, them geese and their ancestors, just like a lot of these houses, they seen a lot of changes in this lake too. Want to hear about them? Well sir, you just stop paddlin' for a minute and let this canoe drift while I tell you some of the things I've heard from the talk of the house. Sure houses talk. You just take a cold winter night - say 'bout 20 below and the moon a shinin' down on that white snow and there ain't a sound. Seems like you can hear your own shadow move. Then, that's when they start - sure, some calls it frost pullin' out the nails. Mebbe, but you listen.

Right over there on Green Lake was probally the first two cottages around here. One was built by them Johnstown Exempt Firemen. To mention a few there was Colby Moore, Pinky Sponenburgs dad, and Ralph Skakels dad. You should hear them rafters ring in there when it's about 30 below out. They sure warm the air, yes sir. But to get on. The old Exempt firemen's cottage, that's where Ralph Skakel is now, then Gardner Lytell he built and Gus Noelk, he has that place. Long in there 'bout that time Cyrus Dury, he built the saw mill and two houses. One where the Paul Kuklas live and the other is Mrs. Tony Wolf's. 'Course the saw mill is gone now, been gone over 30 years. Them houses, Kukla's and Wolf's - they get to braggin' once in a while to them others because they was built for a man that got to be Congressman to the United States, and then was connected with the collector of internal revenue. Course that house has a right to feel that way - Cy Durey, he done a lot for this place and the people in it.

Accordin' to the talk the next place to be built was over in Punky Cove, that's between the old Fulton House and Sand Point. Feller built that was a minister by the name of McKinsey and it was used as a parsonage.

Feel that old east wind blowin comin right down off Camel Hump Mt. tonight, and we've drifted most down to Dolgeville Point.

They call that Dolgeville Point on account of it was settled mostly by Dolgeville folk. Bill Spoar, Julius Breckwoldt, Frerdrickson, and Drums, these two didn't hail from Dolgeville. Then there was Irv McGuire, Will Faville, Ed Sliter, and H.I. Patrie. All of these has changed hands now, the only two which is still in the family is Breckwoldts and Sliters. The original Sliter cottage burned down and Skeet rebuilt right there where the first one was. Skeet and Marie, they run the Canada Lake store now. And Beckwoldts grand daughter, Mrs. Edwin Vosburgh and her husband spend summers at the Breckwoldt cottage. Patries house, sometimes when he gets to listenin' to Dury's he says he was lived in by a man that got to be a New York State Senator. Sometimes they gets to goin' pretty strong back and forth.

We'd best to get startin' back, and on the way we'll skirt along the Canada Lake south shore down by the old Fulton House and I'll show you some of the cottages that was built next. John Q. Adams, Tex Northrup, Al Saltsman, Tracy Cross, they all built about the same time. Then along there where the Fulton House Annex stood is Engels. After the Annex burned down Engels built, and they sorta built around the Annex fire place, puttin' the fire place in their livin' room.

Right over across the lake along that shore road, they call that Kasson Drive now after Mrs. Clay O'Dells brother, Bert Kasson, who was county engineer. Well the first cottage there was by Helen Bushbie, that's where the Clay O'Dells be now, and they say in one of those towers was a fire bell. Then where Brower's is was the second cottage on that road. Them cottages what is now where Willards, the Stanleys, and Smith is, there is a lot of talkin' there. Timbers in them houses claim fame in the sportin' world. These was built by Peck and Snyder. A while later Peck and Snyder merged with Spaulding Brothers sport manufacturers. You know them camps has been heard to say they ain't got no bats in their attics - they are all on the diamond.

But all them places is talkin' about what happened in 1906 — they had hardly got used to seein' them horseless carriages go by when up the road comes a feller ridin' a bycycle lickety split. But he wasn't doin' no pumpin', no sir he was just ridin', and 'twas Tony Beekman astride a motorcycle. Then along 'bout 1910 he built a cottage over on Green Lake. You know Tony's dad was a dickerin' for some land, right over there where Jack Ryans' cottage is now. Well that was owned

by the Mills family and after their daddy died the girls was goin' to sell to Tony's Dad that place and 5 lots there and 5 lots on Mud Lake all for \$1800.00, and then right there in the lawyers' office one daughter, she changed her mind and wouldn't sign off.

And then over on — say feel that flake of snow? I'd better stop talkin' and start paddlin' or we'll be caught in a snow squall. Looks like an early winter — long hard one too. Well, mebbe come spring we can get together again, and if things ain't just the way I told you, well, you let me know. I mighta misunderstood.

And on some of these cold, clear, winter nights with the moon a shinin' bright just listen — you may hear the talk of the house.
