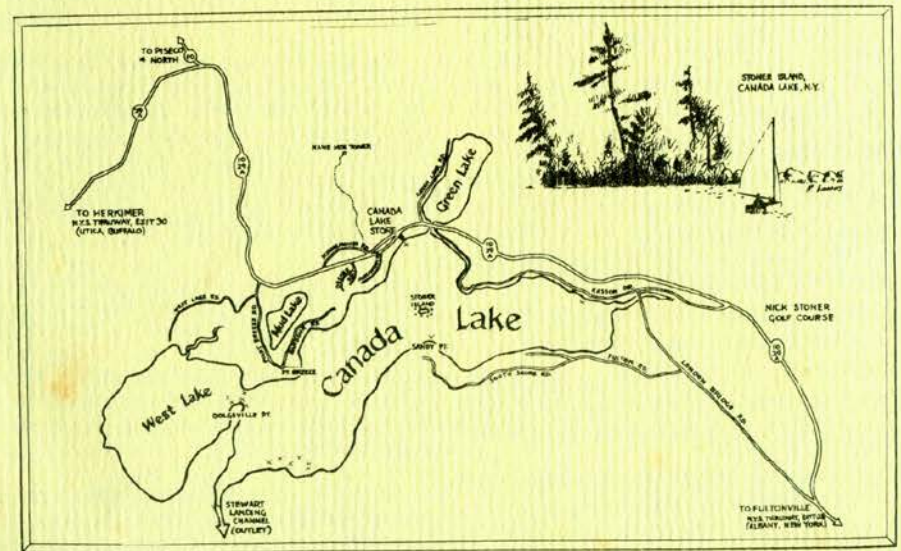

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Another year of activities is at hand for the people on these great lakes of ours. We have put Canada Lake in front by having the flare lighting at the beginning and end of the season. I think it would be a great tribute to our country, for all of us to display our flag. "Old Glory" flying in the breeze at every camp around the lake would be quite a spectacle!

Our lake is in the largest park in the United States. It is even bigger than Yellowstone. The Adirondack Park area is a unique wilderness area; 90% of it is forest lands. Thirteen of the 62 counties in the state are in par or wholly within the park. This section of the Adirondacks is noted for its scenic beauty, sports facilities and historic sites.

Fulton County was a part of the Royal Grants of 1708. Sir William Johnson settled on the Kingsborough patent, a part of this grant. The last battle of the Revolutionary War took place at Johnstown in 1781. On the golf course at Caroga Lake is the statue of Nick Stoner, a Revolutionary War hero, a guide and trapper.

Hamilton County, our neighbor to the north, was named for Alexander Hamilton. The county seat, Lake Pleasant, was settled in 1840. A museum at Blue Mountain Lake depicts log buildings, horse drawn vehicles and early tools used in that era.

Leaving history behind, we return to the present, and the C.L.P.A. One of the newer activities is the youth program for the young people. Their water ski show was a success last year. They hope to repeat it again in 1971. Let's help the young people make their early days on the lake memorable, as they are the future leaders of our group. Remember, we all were young once.

The Association needs money to operate, so see an officer and pay your dues of \$7.50. Ask your neighbor to join. We want you to feel you are contributing to some of the benefits at these Lakes, such as our fight against pollution, the "Echo", card parties for the ladies, fire works off the island, cooperation with Oregon Mountain group for water level control, beach parties at Youngs beach, training courses for better navigation, annual dinner and get-to-gether for officers and town board officials, flare lighting, boat patrol, sail boating and last, but not least, protection of property. Please join and help us with all of these activities.

SAILING — 1970 SEASON

The historic 1970 season is over and past! We had a variety of winds and a variety of boats which saw an increase in total numbers over the preceding year. In 1970, 13 One-Of-A-Kind boats and 24 sunfish competed for a total of 37. This is quite an increase from the 6 boat fleet which initiated Canada Lake Sailing Races just a few years ago.

It is really important that we channel races into individual classes. Our sunfish class is doing well. **We do need more 420's!** This class was selected as our second main class because it is the largest modern sloop class in the world today; it has been found excellent as a racing boat, a day-sailer for the family, and for training juniors in modern racing techniques. If you are going to buy a sailboat or move up from a sunfish, **get a 420!** Kindly see Monty Mason for source of supply and other particulars.

The success of such a program depends on having both students and teachers to make it work. If you or your juniors are interested in instruction, contact the chairman of the racing committee as soon as possible so that organizational details may be worked out.

CALLING ALL SAILORS FOR THE 1971 SEASON!

Looking back, the Racing Committee feels that the scoring system used in 1970 was most successful and the handicap system was the best we could come up with in view of the variety of sailboats entering our races.

Looking forward to the '71 season, we will retain the '70 handicapping and point scoring systems, but in an attempt to encourage entry into our races of all possible skippers we are introducing New Series Rules for competition for the C.L. Sailing Club trophies. We want to award all prizes — SUNFISH, OPEN CLASS and hopefully 420's on the basis of the SKIPPER'S RECORD, rather than on points accumulated by the BOAT SAILED!

There will be three prizes for SKIPPERS of SUNFISH and two each for OPEN and 420, providing that there are at least three skippers completing the series in each group. A Series will consist of a skipper's best **five scores** out of the entire **eight races** to be sailed.

JOHNSTOWN FISH HATCHERY

The state is talking of closing the Johnstown Fish Hatchery (among several others throughout the state). Locally we are quite concerned as the major part of the restocking program for this area originates at the Johnstown Hatchery. It is also a tourist attraction, many visitors going there in the summer. Organizations from this area and sporting clubs have been asked, and are writing to Glenn H. Harris, Assemblyman, in protest of the announcement; also write to Senator Niles, Gloversville, N.Y.

If sportsmen are not to receive benefit from the fees which they pay for fishing and hunting, then the next step is to demand the lowering of such fees.

Everyone's cooperation would be appreciated, and the reconsideration to reopen the hatchery is well worth the effort we extend toward that end.

FALLIN' LEAVES

Sure is quiet here today — and those leaves just keep comin', seemin' to say in their own silent way that another year is drawin' to a close. And winter is gettin' ready to set in. See them squirrels scamperin' about, and just notice how confused they act. Know what their trouble is? Well, I'll tell you. See right round through here all them dead beeches — well, them squirrels is friskin' about lookin' fer beechnuts, on account they have heard so much from their ancestors 'bout what a good spot this was fer winter supply nut gatherin'. Now they are plumb buffaloed — yep — no one got to tell them the blight went through here a spell back and now there is nary a bearin' beech tree — how you goin' to tell a squirrel that?

Well, young feller, sure hate to think of your leavin' these parts — we've had a lot of visitin' — mebbe when you get settled down in your new home you'll find things workin' your way so you'll come back for a visit, and I'll do the listenin' — course, there's still a lot I ain't told you. Well, fer instance, there's the story 'bout the old Cracker Box Club, as this group of as nice a bunch of young fellers as you'd ever want to meet called themselves. Had their club house on Green Lake, 'bout where Kenneth Richards camp is. They formed themselves into a club and made canoe trips through the area, and did a bit of hikin' too. They was so busy plannin' trips and makin' trips they had no time to think 'bout doin' nothin' wrong. Can't rightly recall who all belonged to that club — let's see — there was the Dankert boys, Raymond Arnsfield, Walter Ponberg, and James Tymelson, was a few that come to mind. Lumberin' was going full blast through them years so they had plenty of lumber camps to visit for one thing to do.

There was camps at Indian Lake Stream, Eastman Lake, Sheely Mt., Camel Hump Mt., Nine Corner Lake, and West Lake. They never had to worry 'bout goin' hungry neither. Lumber jacks had to eat, and there was a boardin' house on West Lake — Giffords' they called it, where Mosher's is now — and another one was what later come to be the Sy Durey residence. And if you never have et at a lumber jack table spread you have never et. Them was the kind of victuals what made men out of boys. Like I said, lumberin' was big business through here for a good many years. One of the first saw mills was owned by Wheeler and Craftsman — their mill set in that vacant lot cross the road from Wallace

Crispins near the Pine Lake outlet stream. Then Frank Sherman, Sr., had a big mill by the Pine Lake dam. And there was a boardin' house there too, that's the buildin' now called Timberline Inn. They was a school there too fer the youngsters who lived round there. That school got closed after some of the parents led by H.G. "Colby" Moore raised quite a ruckus. What was the ruckus all about? Well, seems that school was right over the top of a blacksmith shop, and if that warn't bad enough, on top of the school was the water storage tank in case a stray spark caught that buildin' or some neighborin' one on fire. Appears like the parents was afraid if the kids didn't get burned up, they had a pretty good chance of gettin' drowned to death.

Then there was another little inconvenience. The youngsters and teacher had to share the toilet facilities with the people what worked in the saw mill, 'long with them what was gettin' their horses shod, and them that was doin' the shooin'. Guess that was what one could really call sharin' and sharin' alike. I got to thinkin' of that a spell back when I was readin' where kids in school today wants their own private lounge and smokin' room. Guess mebbe it's all what a person gets used to. Anyway, Colby, who had a daughter goin' there (Harriet Christman now) went to the Albany Education Department, and them fellers figured that was a bit too rugged even for rugged people, so that school got closed and them students went to Wheelerville.

Look at them squirrels — ain't that pitiful. They sure are goin' to have a time gettin' their larders filled from this place. But, back to book learnin'.

There was quite a few families workin' in the woods and saw mills for the Durey Land & Lumber Co., and since the mill was at Canada Lake it was thought best to build a school there and save transportin' the kids to Wheelerville. They built themselves a school on what is now School House Road, and the buildin' is now occupied by Mrs. Beatrice Holliday as a residence. Mrs. Minnie Sargeant was the first teacher and she had quite a passal of youngsters enrolled. To mention a few, there was the Gages, Rowers, and Dureys. Then of course, there was the Wheelerville School, at Wheelerville, which was quite a community. Big saw mill and quite a few families settled there. The Nick Stoner Inn was a bit barn in them days. The stables was in the lower ground level, and the upper ground level was used for storage of wagons, etc. The town office building was where the

folks gathered on a Saturday night fer dancin' and underneath was a storage shed for wagons and other equipment.

Gettin' a mite chilly — sun goin' down and looks like cloudin' up. With winter comin' on I ain't lookin' forward with much relish to facin' another one like that last year. Man and boy I've seen winters come and go, but I ain't never seen one come worsen than that, and I ain't never been gladder to see one go than that one. 173 inches of snow fell, and it got so me and my little woman was afeared to set foot outside without puttin' on snow shoes first. Lots of damage done — they say over 100 cottages caved in or have been sprung by the snow's weight. Of course, we all felt pretty bad when word got round that the Chapel had fallen in. That was organized Sept. 22, 1922, and the middle part was built in 1923. To take care of the crowds the two side wings was built in 1939. One of the guest ministers was Luther P. Finke, who married Marjorie Dennison, whose people had a camp on Canada Lake. For years Mr. and Mrs. William Fuller of Gloversville, and Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Carson of Little Falls who had camps at Pine Lake took flowers for the sanctuary every Sunday.

Well, time is gettin' away from us, and here we be back at the clearin', and I guess the end of the trail. Hope you have the best of luck

young feller, and mayhap you'll get by this way again — these have been pleasant years, and the good Lord willin', we'll meet here again — in the fallin' leaves.
