

Dear Sailors and Landlubbers:




Last year's Season Trophy Awards were presented at our final cocktail party. A Division Sunfish Trophy went to Paul Franz, with Barbara Patterson in second place and Mike Cannon in third. In B Division, there was a tie for first place, shared by Jack Egan and Brian Franz. Margaret Long won the third place award. Because of limited contestants, we only presented two awards in the other divisions. In the Open Class, Bob Fogel was first and Ed Partenope was second. John Castilloux and Courtney Young, Jr. tied for the first place in the 420 Division.

The schedule for 1974 was discussed at the March meeting, and many new plans were formulated for the sailors for this season. A general membership meeting will be held at Patterson's dock on July 5 at 10:00 a.m. At this meeting new copies of the ground rules will be available. We are also drawing up new sailing maps with some new courses for all to

for this race, Bernie Caringe will give the 420 Trophy and the Directors of the Sailing Club will give the Open Class Trophy. All of these awards will be presented at the first CLPA meeting in July.

Our regular racing schedule with the first horn always sounding at 1:25 p.m. will be held every Saturday with Sundays as rain dates. So we will race July 13, 20, 27, and August 3, 10, 17, 24, and 31. We will have a special team race on August 4.

All our season trophies will be awarded on the same basis as the past few years, but from now on the CLSC Sunfish A Division award will be known as the Jack Ryan Trophy and the CLSC 420 Division Season Award will be known as the Monte Mason Trophy.

Because no one qualified for the Bogart Awards last year, the directors decided to wait and present them at the end of the 1974 season. Any young people who have not won a trophy before and are 16 years or younger are eligible to compete for this season's award. For these young people, and for others who would like to improve their sailing, the club will hold a weekly clinic on Friday afternoons under the direction of Courtney Young, Jr. These clinics will begin at 1:00 p.m. at various places around the lake. Check the store for locations. Rick Fink, a member of our committee who works at the store, will be our liaison with new sailors, so contact him or look at our bulletin board at the store for further notice of events.

On September 1, we will hold a Last Chance Novice Race to reward new sailors. Your Directors have pledged to make this year the year when everyone can learn to sail or improve his racing skills. Now all we need are students.

The A Division Sunfish Sailors will consist of all those who were in A Division before plus those who won trophies in 1973. The committee adopted several other changes in our procedures, including some new mini trophies for short series. We did this out of concern that gas shortages may limit the participation of some sailors, and if these measures are needed they will be announced at the first meeting.

We are desperate for help with our races, so that all of our members who wish can sail. We are looking for starters and time keepers, and if you are interested contact Marty Franz. We also need safety boats and John Castilloux will meet with all safety boat skippers early in the season to instruct them in proper procedures. The sailors appreciate all the support

given them and invite all those who help us to attend our two major social functions.

The first event will be a pot luck supper on August 3 and Jean Curran has kindly offered to hold it at her camp. Our annual cocktail party and award presentation will be held at the Paterson's dock on August 31 at 4:30 in the afternoon.

REMEMBERING JEFF

Canada Lake not only has had a hermit, it now has a growing legend. With the death of Jeff Reed, there will be no more adventures, but his stories will be long remembered.

Of course, now we will never know the truth of many of the tales that were told about him or all those wild stories he used to tell himself. While I am pretty sure that the stories he told my children about the crocodiles under London Bridge were not true, I do not doubt for one minute the size and numbers of frogs he caught in the inlet. And he probably used the bizarre methods he told my children to try, for everyone said he knew all the frogs' calls and could "bring them right out from under a lily pad."

No one who has seen Jeff walking along the road with a huge string of trout can doubt he knew the best secret places to find them.

Many years ago when my children were little, I asked him where he picked those enormous blueberries he gave away so generously. He said it was much too dangerous for me to take the children there to pick, for the place was full of bears, he claimed. The next morning a loud knock on my door, very early in the morning startled me, but it was just Jeff, with a couple of baskets of juicy berries.

Many residents of Canada Lake remember his gifts of wild strawberry jam, his "Hilly Billy Jam." He used to pick cranberries at Chub Lake, and sometimes he even got them way back in the swamps of Negro Lake.

While many people remember his gifts and the sight of him walking down the lake roads, few remember where he really came from, and so the legends grew. Was he really a member of Dutch Schultz' gang, or a driver for Legs Diamond? He said he was born on Rutledge Street in Charleston, South Carolina, but he lived in the New York City area for many years. And he certainly seems to have left New York precipitously during prohibition. He told Dr. Buckbee that he had run a garage and one day a bootlegger came and "took him for a ride". Perhaps he was the fall guy for someone, but he was running, and he didn't stop until he got to Canada Lake. For a long time after he was still afraid for his existence. He had a huge police dog for a companion and protection and he never turned his back to the door of a public place.

It wasn't just arriving at Canada Lake with the mystery of his background that made such Texas.

a stir. Jeff was an unusually handsome man, with a long curled and waxed blonde mustache. And he was very much alady's man. I can remember him on North State Road driving along in his open Ford with a very good looking blonde female companion. I have also been told that he had several flings with Canada Lake wives, from the other side of the lake, and almost "broke up a couple marriages." I have always been puzzled by the fact that I was told that his adventures were only with women from the south shores.

In the last few years his ragged beard and rough clothes did little to confirm the fact that he had been such a sharply dressed man. I wonder if in those days he only took baths in Nine Corner Lake. He told my children that this was the only place he ever bathed and I despaired that they would try to follow his example.

From the earliest times that he was at the lake he had a reputation for imbibing. One resident remembers the time he was driving along Point Breeze Road, tight as could be, in his open Ford en route to plant some flowers for a summer resident. The winding dirt road was too much for the Ford and the booze, and the car tipped over. Unabashed, Jeff was seen rising from the Ford, ageranium in each hand, looking like a "perfect gentleman." By the way, the Ford is still up in a field in Arietta.

After the demise of the Ford, Jeff continued to make the rounds of all the watering spots in the north, but on foot. Many times we saw him on the road 'to Avery's, and like everyone else, we always offered him a ride. Still, he didn't always get a ride and it is a twenty mile walk. How he negotiated it late at night is quite a mystery.

For years he lived in a little cabin on the back of the Rohrs' property. He kept a notebook and all different cards printed up to put on the door to explain his absence to callers: One day, John Brower found the sign, "Gone With the Wind."

Jeff existed by being a handyman and caretaker for many summer people, all of whom attest to his honesty. Dr. Buckbee says that at one time Jeff had the keys to 38 camps around the lake, and there were never any break-ins when Jeff was in charge. Considering the simplicity of the way he lived, it turned out that he was a real miser. He left an estate of thirty thousand dollars! He had one known relative, a niece who now lives in Texas.

He also left everyone on the lake the warmth of his friendship, his gifts from nature, and most of all the wild tales that contribute so much to rainy days and gossips on Canada Lake. His legend will always be a part of our summer lore.

(If anyone else remembers more of Jeff's wild tales, I would appreciate being told them. I'd like to make a record of his adventures, before they fade from our memories.)


