According to him the Indian word for the rivers which we now know as the East and West Canada Creeks were the Kan-at-a's. Kan-at-a was an Indian word meaning "amber river" for the West Canada was known especially for its amber colored waters. It seems likely that the steamboat proprietors of Fulton's Hotel knew this word, and hence the name Kanaughta for their largest steamboat.

The word probably also gave us the name Canada for the lake, for although there was an Indian village on Dolgeville Point, or Pine Bluff as the ancients called it, the village was small and only a seasonal hunting place.

# RUFUS ALEX GRIDER

Rufus Alex Grider was an artist who lived for several years in Canajoharie and painted many Adirondack scenes during the latter part of the Nineteenth Century. Several notebooks of his original water colors are in the Library of the State Museum. They are treasures, virtually inaccessible to the public. He also chronicled upstate history and lore and annotated his paintings with facts and incidents relating to Adirondack life.

This winter another one of his sketch books came to light. It is a real gem devoted exclusively to Canada Lake. I have had a copy of the book made and placed in the Town Hall for all to see. It is hoped that the book will eventually be a part of a museum of Caroga History. Most of the sketches in it are black and white washes, sketches of the mountains and hotels around the lake. It is interesting that he quoted the Snyder letter in full. That letter was the first written record we have of the lake. He also quoted from the Loch Villa guest book which we were able to use for the town's history. It is too bad that this work was not available at the time the history went to press, but the following is a rather complete explanation of where the fish in Canada Lake went and why the fishing became so poor.

Do go and look at the other parts of the writing and enjoy his sketches. We are indeed fortunate to have so valuable an historical record.

By the way, the spelling, punctuation, and capitalization in the following are as Mr. Grider wrote it.

## ABOUT FISHES AND FISHING

Rufus Alex Grider, 1896

Fishing before the 1866 is still recollected and spoken of by those who visited the Lake ere the lumbering and tanning began.

Mr. Isaac M. Davis, Merchant, from Fonda, N.Y. visited the Lake in 1860, and also in later years, he says that the statements that fish were abundant is true. That he caught speckled Trout at many places — at Sand Point, in West Lake — in Black Hole, in the Outlet, also in the stream above the Lake and below Stone dam, also around the Island.

"At Sand Point was a breeding place. He says the water was pure and clear, through 20 feet of water I could see the white sand bottom distinctly."


"My guide AVERY told me that one night when gliding along quietly with lighted torch he saw the white bottom covered with Lake Trout, could spear as many as he desired."

"AVERY also told me that one cool spring morning the sun shone brightly, when rowing quietly along the North shore of the Lake, below Stony Point, he saw hundreds, perhaps thousands of white projections on the glassy surface, it proved to be a large school of Lake Trout with their Dorsal fins above the surface of the water, they were enjoying a Sun-bath, as soon as the waves, or the noise of the approaching boat reached, all disappeared caused commotion in the water as did the ascending air bubbles from every fish which descended."

Please drive cautiously and slowly when driving on the roads around Canada Lake this summer.

## WINTER FISHING

Mr. Davis states, is not yet practiced as formerly. "A hole is cut through the ice, the hook baited and sunk, the line fastened to a branch or bush, the branch is secured in the snow or ice, if the branch moves it means a "strike" or bite, if the weather is cold the fisher can move about and keep comfortable by exercise, this method very likely was learned from the Indians.

Lake Trout weighing over 22 pounds and Speckled Trout weighing 2 to 7 pounds were caught there before SAW-DUST — TAN-BARK — and liquor from the tanning vats were emptied into this charming fish producing Reservoir, the bottom of the Lake became coated with a brownish deposit which destroyed the food upon which the young fish live, the floating sharp sawdust entered into the gills of the fish and interfered with their brething and killed them.

The Sawdust and Bark should have been burnt and the Lake left unpolluted as they found it.

The guide Avery before 1860, it is said, introduced that freshwater SHARK the PICKEREL, later Mr. Tunicliff of the first Hotel planted the OTSEGO lakd BASS, here called PERCH, also a voracious fish eater, the two varieties soon cleared the lake of the "Speckled beauties" not one remains.

Fish of all varieties are now scarce because they cannot multiply as formerly.

The Creek from Wheelerville to the Lake was formerly navigable to the lake by large Keel boat, the Channel near the head of the lake was 15 to 40 feet deep, now, where the water formerly existed acres of Sawdust and Tan-bark cover the surface, and a Peninsula of those materials extends into the lake, yes a Stage road is now located upon it, an aged resident stated that the Sawdust at places was 15 feet deep.

The greater portion could yet be destroyed by fire if those most interested should determine to do so, it does not decay when dry on shore, nor when submirged.

## AN HISTORICAL FOOTNOTE

While I was researching the History of the Town of Caroga, I tried to discover the origins of many of the Indian sounding names that were used in the town. While we had some luck with a few names, others are still a mystery.

Canada is an Indian word which means a "mass of huts." However, it is just possible that the word from which the name of our lake derived had a different origin. This winter I read a reprint of Historical Sketches of Northern New York and Adirondack Wilderness by Nathaniel Sylvester which he wrote in 1877.

Collections made Monday on all **Public roads** throughout the town-ship, and in addition on Fridays during the months of July, August and September in the area north from a line at Newkirks extending across the Town. If collection day falls on a legal holiday, collection made the following day. Pick up of garbage will be carried out in front of each private dwelling, with the containers to be placed within six feet of the road. Garbage to be collected is defined as all table and kitchen refuse and the cans and containers they came in. **All such garbage must be wrapped and placed in either a plastic bag or a garbage can and the garbage can shall be a covered metal or plastic container with handle locks not to exceed a 12 gallon capacity.**
