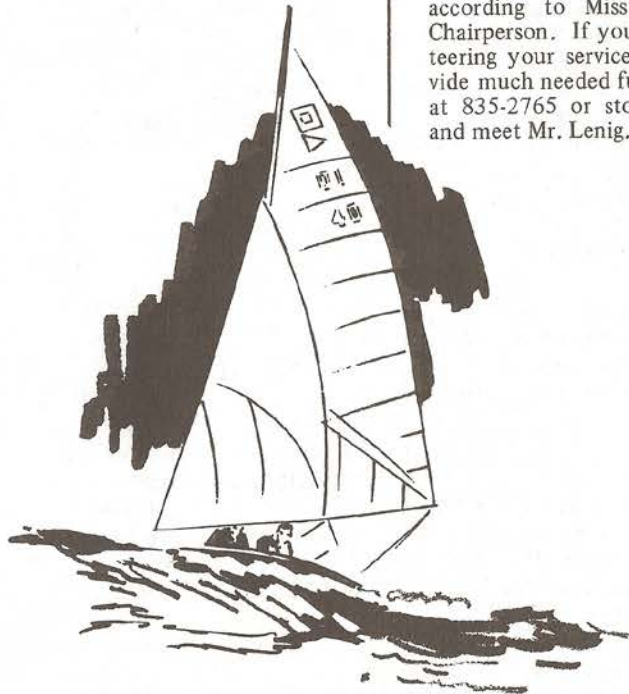
INVEST IN CAROGA'S FUTURE BY

Dismantling a 123 year old pegged barn turned out to be a very exacting and time consuming project. Although many local volunteers worked diligently during the summer of 1983 the barn is not completely dismantled. But starting on June 2, 1984 work will resume on the dismantling and moving of the main barn framework to "The Homestead" site.

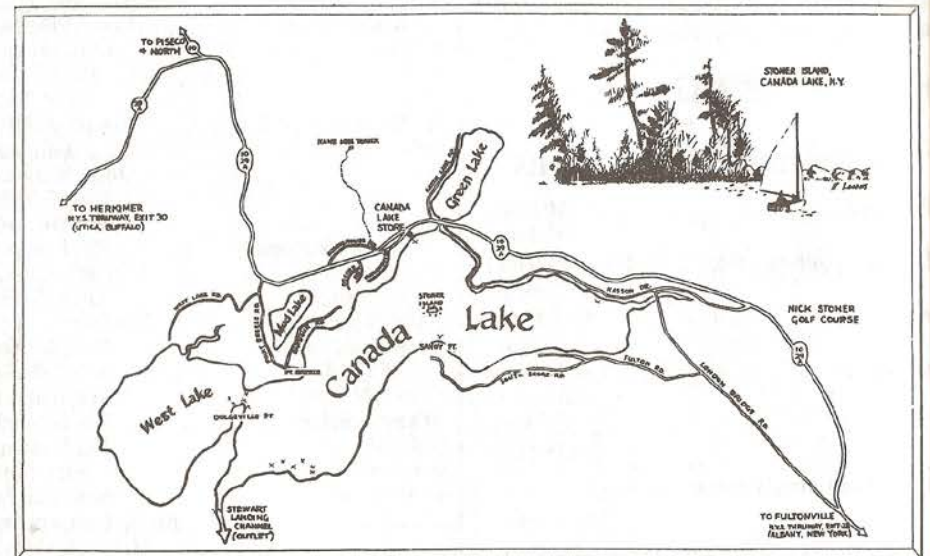
Because of the time and effort this undertaking will entail we are limiting our 1984 summer schedule in order to concentrate on the erection of the barn which will be the main Museum building.

We will have a professional Museum Curator, Mr. Wayne Lenig, a well known area Museologist who will provide guidance on the barn rebuilding and assist the Museum Committee to establish professional standards for the collection, registration, labeling and care and proper storage of the many artifacts of the Caroga area.

The seasonal employment of Mr. Lenig was made possible by a grant provided by the New York State Council on the Arts according to Miss Mary Tasheff, Grants Chairperson. PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Since its inception in 1922, the CLPA has been successful in confronting a wide range of environmental and protection problems. As in the past, we currently face many important issues.

Of particular concern this year is the proposed use of Stewarts Landing Dam as a potential source of power generation. The application for a permit to generate power is a long term process and could take 4 or 5 years. The first phase of the application has begun which allows the applicant 18 months to develop a feasible plan and to respond to logistical, physical and environmental concerns. The CLPA will watch the situation closely to determine what action should be taken by our association.

Acid rain also continues to be an important issue and will be closely monitored by the acid rain committee.

Many activities are being planned for the upcoming season which should encompass a broad range of interests. Your involvement in the activities and concerns of the CLPA is greatly appreciated, encouraged, and necessary for the continuation of a successful tradition. Please show your support by attending the annual meeting on July 14th.

In addition, such knowledge is useful to the D.E.C. in establishing stocking policy. Please give any information regarding bass or trout taken to Bill Fielding or record it on the CLPA board at the Canada Lake Store.

ACID RAIN

Acid rain remains a prime concern to the environment, especially as it effects the northeast. Much research is being conducted relating to the extent of acidification and the cause. Some programs underway in the Adirondacks include a comprehensive biological/chemical survey of 1200 lakes and ponds and a study of methods and long term effects of acid neutralization techniques. (specifically liming), on these test waters.

Another interesting project being undertaken by the Department of Environmental Conservation, (D.E.C.) near Raybrook, N.Y. is the neutralization of an acidic lake by the addition of soda ash. Soda ash is pumped into the sediment of the lake bottom and is supposed to maintain the lake at a balanced p.h. for an extended period of time.

Many scientists, environmentalists, and concerned residents push for legislation in congress that would immediately limit sulfur and nitric oxide emissions by utilities. Industry argues that more research is necessary before they spend the money on emission controls. Congress is still in a deadlock on the issue.

Hopefully research will bring hard answers to the problem of acid rain and point toward solutions soon. In the meantime our efforts as Adirondack residents must be to write our legislators and encourage strict legislation and enforcement on emission control.

The acid rain committee of the C.L.P.A. will continue to monitor the P.H. condition of the Lake and investigate any possible neutralization action if it becomes necessary.

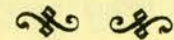
News from the Petrie — Davis Family

Court Young, Jr. won the 4th of July Race — an omen of the '83 sailing season. There was a three-way tie for second — Geoff Clifford, Paul Franz and Dick Loomis — the perennial bridesmaids!

Court Young, Jr. won the Olde Tymers Race with Dick Loomis second and Dave Fisher third.

Court Young, Jr. won the July Super Sunfish series with a perfect score of 3½ points. Geoff Clifford and Dick Loomis each had 11 points but Dick won the second place trophy due to better head-to-head results. Paul Franz finished fourth only ½ point behind.

Court Young, Jr. won the August Super Sunfish series (again with a perfect score), Dick Loomis was second (6¼ points), Paul Franz third (13), Geoff Clifford fourth (14) and Court Young, Sr. fifth (24).

Court Young, Jr. won the Super Sunfish chevron awarded by Alcott for the best results of the summer. Dick Loomis, Paul Franz, Geoff Clifford and Court Young, Sr. finished in that order.

Court Young, Jr. placed first (6¼ points) in the Force 5 class of the annual Canada Lake Regatta. Visiting sailors Bob Cullen (15¼), Tom Oryniak (22) and Byron Hicks (24) followed. Peter Young won the Super Sunfish class with 6¼ points. Greg Young (15¼), Dick Loomis (24), Geoff Clifford (27) and Court Young, Sr. also completed the four race series. Nancy Long, Dorothea Loomis and Dave Fisher did not sail enough races to qualify in the Super Sunfish class.

Mike Cannon (5 points) beat Dave Fisher (7½) in the July Sunfish "A" Division and Parker Davis (6¼) won the "B" Division over Alan Farber (7¼). Parker moved up to "A" Division in August and edged out Lane Franz, both with 6¼ points, for first place. Alan Farber was third (16). Randy Ryan (3¼) beat brother Paul (10) in the July "B" series. They also shared the Bogart Trophies as the most improved young sailors of the

season. Parker Davis won the Alcott Sunfish chevron with Lane Franz a close second followed by Alan Farber.

In lieu of Team Races, a Round Robin Boat Exchange Race Series was held — results weren't kept, but the unanimous good times encouraged a repeat of the event this summer.

The summer of '83 will be remembered for the debut of the First Annual Phenomenal Relay Race. Although few teams signed up prior to the race, 33 — count'em — contestants showed up at the Canada Lake store to compete. BOAT SAFETY

C.L.P.A. members Sue Mitchell, Brian McIntosh and Emily Langworthy have become certified to instruct the New York State Young Boaters' Safety Program. They will be conducting a course for ten year olds and over during the summer at a time to be announced. Check the C.L.P.A. bulletin board for details.

BOAT SAFETY REMINDERS

Be sure you have an approved boat cushion for each person on board at all times.
Use running lights after sunset.
Don't speed near shore, docks or floats.

FIRE TIPS

Have at least one fire extinguisher per building.
Have a hose, with nozzle, hooked up to an outside faucet.

Know where the nearest fire pump (red box) is located (Bud Ryan's on West Lake, Parks Landis' and Warren Dennie's on S. Shore., Bob Petrie's on Dolgeville Point and in Bell Fielding's workboat).

Know how to operate these pumps or ask any Director for instruction.

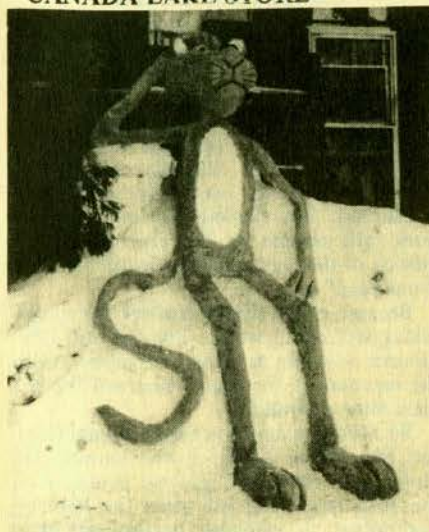
