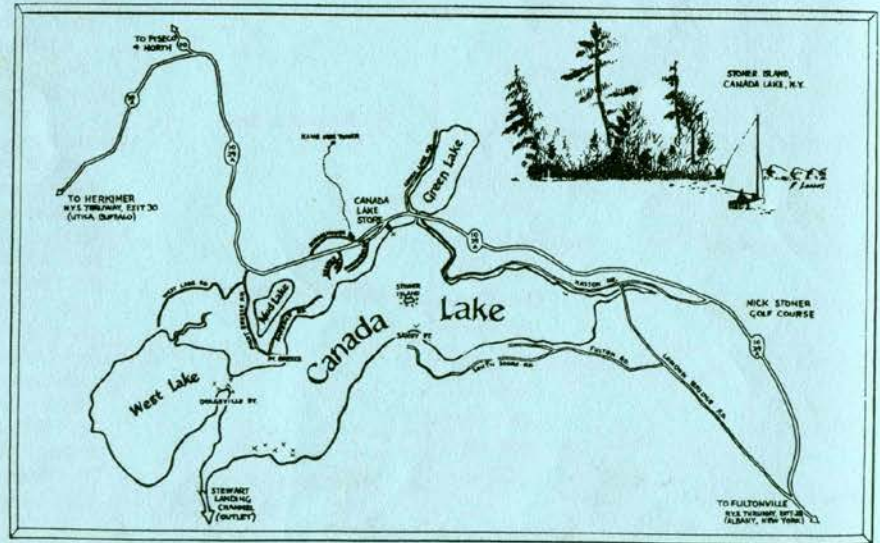

### FISHING COMMITTEE REPORT

**Stocking**-We anticipate the stocking of 2600 lake trout again this spring.

As noted in the past, information relating to the fish in the lakes is important because it can be used by the D.E.C. in establishing stocking policy. In addition it can be an indication of the aquatic environment. Please give any information regarding bass or trout taken to Bill Fielding or record it on the CLPA board at the store.

## ACID RAIN COMMITTEE REPORT

D.E.C. research has shown recovery in many Adirondack waters in the past few years, probably due to lack of heavy snow accumulation. This year has been no exception. As a result, we anticipate that the Ph will be at least as high as last year's reading if not slightly higher, which indicates lower acidity.

Scientists warn that even though there appears to be a Ph recovery due to lack of snow fall, the buffering capacity of Adirondack waters is low and could experience a sudden drop in the Ph after a winter with a heavy snowfall.

The Acid Rain Committee of the CLPA plans to take water samples in the late spring for DEC analysis. It is widely recognized that acid rain should be controlled by reduction of emissions. Your efforts are important in encouraging our legislators to pass legislation to reduce emissions.

## MEMORIES

### *A Few of Many*

Though no longer a property owner at Canada Lake, memories of past ownership of property from the channel to the lake, visits, and activities of 50 plus years remain.

My first look and ride up the channel in the steamer, sitting near the boiler, my first look at the Fulton House, its vast expanse of lattice work, the lobby, my mother relating the story of the big fire which destroyed that lovely hotel where we had spent a few vacation days that summer. — All made a lasting impression on me.

One summer while my uncle and family were visiting us we rented a camp from Frank Tyoe located at what was known then as Negro Lake Bay. Frank, a Dolgeville resident, was a very good friend of my family and gave us rides around the lake in his boat "Teaser", of which he was very proud. When the boat burned Frank replaced it and named the replacement "Teaser II". I have never forgotten an episode which occurred one night. The chimney from the living room stove went through the ceiling, presumably to heat the upper rooms in colder weather. The stove and pipe had been removed for the summer, the only evidence remaining was the hole through the ceiling where the pipe had been. One night in answer to nature's call I mistakenly used the stove pipe hole for something far beyond its original purpose. My uncle, who was sleeping below began to have an uncomfortable feeling, a bit dampish. For a moment he couldn't reconcile rain, a leaky roof, and the sky filled with stars. But when the cause of his discomfort was discovered my father, wielding a paddle, caused me much discomfort. Though the story might have been told and retold the incident was never repeated.

My father and I were vacationing in one of the channel camps at Stewarts Landing. During the night I was taken ill and my father recognized it as more serious than an ordinary stomach ache. Bundling me in blankets and carrying me to the row boat started out for the landing. Sick as I was, I realized he was having problems locating and remaining in the channel. It was a tortuous night for him and a long buggy ride to Dolgeville for both of us.

One summer the family rented the Drum cottage for a week, and that was my first lesson in the storage of ice. When told that

ice was kept from melting by being packed in saw dust, I had to explore and check every day to see if the ice had melted away. It probably was fortunate our stay there was a short one, or I would have had the ice all uncovered.

Dr. Loucks, a Salisbury native who became a well known surgeon and went to China as a medical missionary spent part of his summer vacationing at the William Faville cottage on Dolgeville point. Each summer we visited him and his family, and we would be treated to the story he and my father always relived and told: When in Salisbury practicing, the doctor was called to visit a patient with severe stomach pains. The problem was diagnosed as appendicitis, and an immediate operation necessary. An "operating room" was set up in the kitchen and two or three men, including my father, held lanterns while the surgery was performed. The story had a happy ending — the patient recovered.

Both the inlet and outlet of Canada Lake were the scenes of two labor related deaths. A stratford man employed as a sawyer at the Canada Lake Saw Mill was killed a few minutes before quitting time when a knot flew from a log which he was sawing and hit him in the chest. It was said that death was instantaneous. My father was called around supper time and he and the driver left to bring the body to Dolgeville. The journey had to be made by horses, as expected, they were gone most of the night.

The other accidental death occurred at Stewart's Landing during the construction of the dam. A member of the crew of steeple jacks, erecting the stand pipe, was killed when he fell from a distance of 180 feet. Though the exact cause of his fall was not known the workmen said there had been a heavy wind blowing that day and it was thought somehow he lost his hold on the ladder. I remember these incidents well, as my father, an undertaker, was involved in each. The stand pipe could be seen for many miles, but it was dismantled when the power company abandoned the dam.

Nate Hawley's dance pavillion. That was as much a part of the looked for summer events as was the lake itself — at least by those considering an evening of socializing and dancing as part of their pleasure, and recreation. Lorenz Franz and I along with many others rarely missed a Saturday night drive to the lake and Hawleys. It was well

known that "Nate" ran a very respectable dance pavillion — one night it was said that he refused admittance to a girl because she had her stockings rolled beneath her knees.

1936. We purchased the Ray Kilbourne cottage on the west side of Dolgeville point. Though I had seen "Skeet" but rarely since he had left Dolgeville, we once again became "neighbors". At ice harvest time we would meet him and Marie at Ungers, then spend the weekend with them at their home as a "camp". One of "Skeets" favorite anecdotes was the evening when he sat on Petries porch discussing the events of the day. A row boat containing four men was seen rowing slowly along the shore line and calling out the names of the various camps, adding their own comments. When opposite the Petrie cottage one of the men could be heard spelling "E-I-R-T-E-P, "eartap", he could be heard saying, "that's a ——— of a name for a camp." "Skeet" said Mr. Petrie always got a chuckle when recalling that incident.

In 1947 we purchased the Paul Steintert property and in 1950 retired and moved to the lake. During the 1950's Arden Zipp, a Dolgevillian, suggested at a C.L.P.A. meeting that the summer season be ended on some sort of ceremonial note of friendship, such as a boat parade. The suggestion was adopted, he was promoted to Admiral, and the fall boat parade became an instant success.

Another looked for event at the season's end was the lighting of the flares by campers to bid each other adieu.

Though I don't know the originator, the lighting of the flares around the lake by the campers to bid a farewell to summer and each other became a looked for event. To LeRoy Loomis, another Dolgevillian, it became a special event. Few loved the lake more than Roy, and each year he appointed himself a committee of one to assure himself that all cottagers would be provided with flares — and it was a lovely sight, seeming to draw everyone together.

1975. Our children were married and left the nest. It was the intent of my wife and myself to sell our property keeping one camp so that we might spend our summers at Canada Lake and winters south. The regulations of the newly formed A.P.A. prohibited that.

Thus it was after many years the time came to bid our adieu to Canada Lake, but the memories of events and old friends remain with us.

**"The Homestead"**

Obviously 123 year old pegged barns do not take kindly to being dismantled, especially the second time around, during their lifetime. Each timber, peg and post was dismantled by a caring and dedicated group of volunteers. Their task was not easy as much of the wood was brittle.

With Mother Nature's cooperation work will be getting started soon to complete the rebuilding by our scheduled dedication date of July 20, which is also Major Nicholas Stoner Day.

Now we need all the voluntary help and financial assistance from all of our friends to raise the barn which will be our main Museum building.

We have a full summer schedule ahead including three fund raising events and a new feature.
