The speed limit within 100' of shore, decks, rafts, floats, or anchored boats is 5 m.p.h.

The speed limit during the period from a half hour after sunset to a half-hour before sunrise is 15 m.p.h.

Beware of B.W.I. (Boating While Intoxicated)

Be on the look out for floating logs, boards, etc.

Waterskiing is prohibited from sunset to one hour after sunrise.

Remember to have an observer 10 years of age or older when touring a water skier.

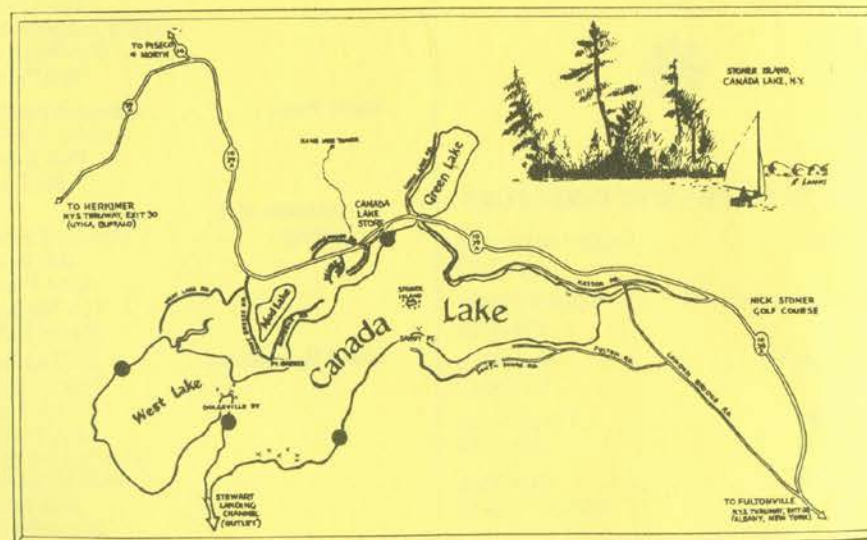

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The May 3rd groundcover of snow not withstanding, traditional signs of spring—from trillium to black flies—are in evidence. Those of you who were at the lakes at all during the winter know that we had the best winter in quite a few years for winter sports. Now it's time to look forward to summer.

The concerns of the Association involve Directors throughout the year and this year is no exception. Several issues raised last summer and fall have been given much attention. Bill Fielding and I attended a meeting in Northville about water levels. The outcome of the meeting is described elsewhere in the ECHO and I urge you to read that section.

Nick Stoner Island, which is owned by the C.L.P.A., has been a matter of concern to many of us in a variety of ways. It was determined last summer that several of the trees were unsafe and therefore in need of being either cut down or topped. The decision by the Directors to alter such a distinctive landmark certainly was not an easy one. Clint Bachman, Jr., Dan Yuenger, and Jeff Muller were hired to undertake this project, which was carried out one very cold, windy Saturday in March with the capable help of a small band of stalwart spectator-assistants.

Insurance liability issues have received nationwide publicity, sparked much controversy, and caused wide-ranging effects for private individuals, corporations, municipalities, and the like. The C.L.P.A. has not escaped the impact of increased insurance

premiums and of increased liability risks. From 1979-80 to 1985-86 the insurance premiums have increased from \$156, to \$700. The current policy not only has an enormous premium hike just from the previous year (1984-85: \$411) but also an enormous decrease in coverage, from \$100,000 bodily injury and \$50,000 property damage to \$50,000 aggregate coverage. Furthermore, it appears highly questionable whether or not we will continue to be able to get liability insurance for the Island beyond the current one year policy.

There is concern that in the event of a lawsuit the C.L.P.A. Directors and the members themselves could be involved legally. Certainly such sad and complex repercussions could never have been foreseen at the time in the early 1950's when the Island came to the C.L.P.A. from the Estate of Cy Drury. Social commentaries aside, the Directors and membership as a whole must address themselves to the realities and options at hand. Legal counsel to date does not offer us much hope of removing the liability risk as long as we, the C.L.P.A. continue to own Nick Stoner Island.

New York State Department of Environmental Conservation WILL CONSIDER taking ownership of the Island if that is the will of the membership. Given the size of the Island, The State would be unable to establish a public campsite or to alter the present type of usage of the Island. In light of the serious liability issues which confront us as owners of this property, I will be asking the Directors to approve the proposal of a resolution, to be voted on by the membership at the Annual Meeting, that Nick Stoner Island be given to the State of New York.

Any suggestions will be welcomed which will be helpful to the Directors in serving the needs of the lake community and carrying out our duties.

ACID RAIN COMMITTEE REPORT

For several years we have reported favorable Ph readings in our lakes. However, we also have warned that a heavy snowfall likely would cause a significant drop in the Ph. Although water samples have not been taken yet this spring, they are expected to show a decrease in the Ph indicative of an increase in acidity.

Much publicity has been given to President Reagan's endorsement of S5 B. in research "to attack the problem of acid rain". However, most experts believe that strong legislative action, not research funding, is necessary.

New Federal legislative efforts to adopt an acid rain control program are underway. H.R. 4567, a new bipartisan bill regarded as being comprehensive, strong and fair; is designed 'to mesh solid environmental policy with job protection, cost-efficiency, and flexibility'.

Among the mandates of the bill is one requiring an eleven million ton reduction of sulfur dioxides and a four million ton reduction of nitrogen oxides by 1997. Sulfur dioxide and nitrogen oxides have been shown to cause acid rain not only in the Northeast but also in the West. Just how these reductions will be made would be left up to individual states. Power plants, which emit large amounts of these oxides, would have a number of options available to them for reducing dangerous emissions.

Although the new bill is believed to have a good chance of passing, you can help make acid rain controls a reality. Write your representative and ask his or her support for H.R. 4567. Write your senators and urge them to support any strong acid rain legislation that is proposed in the Senate.

WATER LEVEL REPORT

Bill Fielding and Emily Langworthy met with Department of Environmental Conservation officials and Stewart's Landing Association representatives in February to present the resolution passed at the 1985 Annual Meeting for a later drawn-down schedule and to discuss the issues involved. It is clear to any who have been involved in water level discussions that the vested interests of CLPA members are quite diverse - certainly more so than those of the Stewart's Landing Association - ranging as they do from those who want a lower level to prevent flooding to those who want the level up for duck hunting and access to Dolgeville Point. Beyond our various human concerns is the extensive impact on wildlife which must be considered if the water level is left up until late fall. EnCon officials are to weigh the many considerations and communicate its decision to us; this will be posted on the CLPA bulletin board at the Store upon receipt.

Comments, concerns or complaints about water levels should be made DIRECTLY to Don Decker, Department of Environmental Conservation, Northville, phone 863-4545. It is important to note that although the dam at Stewart's Landing may be open, the water level still may go up, not down, depending on the runoff into the lake being greater than the runoff from the lake due to physical restrictions in the channel to Stewart's Landing.

GREEN UP DAY

This year Green-Up Day will be an activity for people to focus on their own areas and put what is gathered with their own garbage for regular collection. There will be no Green-up Day pickup and household items and debris should not be left for collection then or at any other time.

GARBAGE COLLECTION

is made on Monday on all public roads throughout the year and in addition on Fridays during the months of July-September. Garbage to be collected includes all table scraps and refuse and the cans and containers in which they came; it does not include trash, junk or loose garbage. Bag your garbage and put it in a well-secured can or suspend it out of reach of animals. Check the enclosure that came with your tax bill for dump hours.

Know how to operate these pumps or ask any Director for instructions.

"The Homestead"

Some old pegged barns never die - they become Exhibit Buildings for Historical Museums. That is the case of our aged barn which you recall was moved twice in its lifetime prior to this latest move. The barn was originally built on Adam Rhinehart's property in the Town of Bleecker, then it was moved to the Stock Farm in Caroga where it became the Girl Scout Camp when purchased by the Camp Kowaunkami Corp. who donated it to the Caroga Historical Association and Museum.

In 1983 the barn was dismantled and in the fall of 1985, with the dedicated help of numerous Caroga volunteers, the barn was raised at "The Homestead" site.

We think that the building is a very proud structure, even though it has lost some of its authenticity as a pegged barn due to the necessity of using nails in its last reconstruction, it appears to belong on "The Homestead" site. All volunteers involved with the project are to be commended highly and the support of CLPA is appreciated. We hope you will join us in the dedication ceremony to be held on July 12, 1986. We also plan a Chicken Barbecue for the day, a Barn Dance and notable guests.

Our Curator, Mrs. Susan F. Watkins, is making an appeal for Caroga area artifacts to furnish the period farmhouse dating from 1880 to 1920 either on a
