

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

I have waited until the last possible moment to write my message for this season's ECHO in the hopes that I would be able to tell you that the work on our dam has been, or is nearing completion. To date, I can inform you that my latest conversations with the State engineer tell us that the dam will close on June 8 and that we should have water - depending on the variables of rain and the amount of water in our lake when the dam is closed - by June 15. My own personal investigation would lead me to believe that there are possibilities that these dates could change. I have requested of the State engineer that we converse weekly, and I will post on the association's bulletin board at the store a weekly progress and targeted dates for closing of the dam. There have also been rumors that perhaps the water will go down early again in the fall so that they could complete the restoration project on our dam. I have pleaded with the State to be up front and honest with us so that we could inform the membership of their plans. You have my assurances that we will continue to work to keep you fully apprised as to what is happening at Stewart's Landing.

I look forward to the coming season and working with the Directors as we plan activities for your lake. I would hope that you become active in the association's business. We have tasks from last summer that are ongoing and will need work. I speak specifically of water purity, investigation of spraying and also planning our activities of the season. Water safety is always an issue and I would encourage that we all review the water and boating safety rules of our lake, as well as help to instruct visitors to our lake of the safety rules we feel are most appropriately imposed on our lake. It is the association's intent to work closely with the sanitation officer of Caroga Lake as well as the Sheriff of Fulton County to see all that we have here remains in its most beautiful

Should you have any concerns, please do not hesitate to contact your directors. You will see that we continue with our usual schedule of having our director's meeting preceding our annual meeting. I would encourage that all

members attend the annual meeting so that we can keep abreast of what is happening at our lake and we can also in a unified way find a way to best solve our problems. So that the message to you doesn't sound only of the political or business issues, please be assured that the association's leadership and directors will work equally as hard with recreational items such as sailing, card parties, flare lighting and other activities that the association would desire.

Your directors and leadership offer to you a welcome back, coupled with a sincere wish that you have a healthy and happy summer.

EDITORIAL NOTE

Due to the fact that the firm which had previously printed the ECHO closed this spring we have had to find a new printer. This situation has enabled us to bring the C.L.P.A.'s business to a local company, a move which we feel is appropriate. The good news/bad news effects of these unscheduled changes are that we can bring you an update on the dam situation, but that is possible only because the ECHO is coming to you unavoidably late.

Pres. Lefebvre reported that as of June 10th the Field Engineers and D.E.C. officials were hopeful that the lower gate would be reassembled and the dam closed by June 22nd. They also were hopeful that we would have water at summer level by July 4th.

Don't get your hopes up any higher than the present water level; keep an eye on the bulletin board at the store.

Furthermore - D.E.C. has notified us that they will have to draw down early this fall, and they are looking at a date SHORTLY AFTER LABOR DAY. Plan accordingly!

THE ADIRONDACK PARK NOW AND IN THE 21st CENTURY

The report of the Commission on the Adirondacks in the 21st Century has generated much controversy and concern. We urge you to familiarize yourself with the proposals and to voice your opinions to your New York State lawmakers and to Governor Cuomo. Whether you are a New York State resident or not, you pay taxes on your Adirondack property and should be heard when it comes to matters of how those taxes will be spent and what regulations may affect your property. The N.Y.S. Senator for our area is Hugh Farley and the Representative is Glenn Harris. Mail to Farley should be addressed to N.Y.S. Senate, Albany 12247; mail to Harris at the N.Y.S. Assembly, Albany 12248; and to Governor Cuomo at the Executive Chambers, Capitol Building, Albany 12224.

Copies of the Commission report can be obtained from the Adirondack Commission, 2 City Square, Albany 12207 or call (518) 426-0661. Copies of the summary have been made available at the Canada Lake Store and other locations and can be obtained in quantity from the commission named above.

HOLDING TANK REGULATION - Local Law No. 1 for 1989 requires owners of holding tanks to have them emptied at least once a year and/or when it becomes 75% full or except on appeal to the Sanitary Inspector. PROOF OF PUMPING MUST BE PRESENTED TO THE TOWN CLERK EACH AND EVERY TIME OT IS PUMPED AND NO LATER THAN AUGUST FIRST OF EACH YEAR.

The Caroga Transfer Station, "The Dump" will be open Monday - 7:00am - 4:00pm, Wednesday - 8:00am - 6:00pm, Friday - 7:00am - 4:00pm, Saturday - 7:00am - 12noon. The town must observe all legal holidays observed by Fulton County as our transfer station is owned by the county; therefore garbage collection and transfer station hours will follow county schedule of holidays.

With the help of a90° day the ice left Canada Lake on Saturday, April 28th. We all thought it would be early May since the ice had been nearly 3 feet thick during the winter.

GARBAGE COLLECTION

...is made on Monday on all public roads throughout the year and in addition on Fridays during the months of July-Sept. Garbage to be collected includes all table scraps and refuse and the cans and containers in which they came; it does not include, trash, junk or loose garbage. Bag your garbage and put it in a well secured can or suspend it out of reach of animals. No demolition or construction debris is allowed.

Dump permits now are required. They are obtainable from the Town Clerk for \$1 for cars and \$20 for pick-up trucks. Temporary permits for pick-up trucks are \$5.

FIRE TIPS

Have at least one fire extinguisher per building.

Have a hose, with nozzle, hooked up to an outside faucet.

Know where the nearest fire pump (red box) is located. Sonnenburg's on West Lake, Warren Dennie's on S. Shore, Bob Petrie's on Dolgeville Point, and in Bill Fielding's work boat.

Know how to operate these pumps or ask any Director for instructions.

THOUGHTS ON A LAKE TOUR

The way that wind is a hootin' and a blowin' we may as well figure on a stayin' put tomorrow and not try ice fishin'. You know there's somethin' about a round oak stove and the heat it puts out brings the story tellin' outa me. Ain't been around the lake in several years until last fall when my son Bronson rented a boat from the store and we took a ride. Say, listen to thet wind and the snow pelterin' against the windows. Don't know too many people around here any more, and I reckon there ain't too many here who knows me. Well I've missed bein around and seein my old friends, though there ain't too many 'round anymore.

Over on West Lake rode by Bernie Auerbach's camp, known him and his good wife Margaret for, well, ain't givin' away no years. Not entirely. But afore he was married he was teachin' school in Dolgeville, which is where he met Margaret. Along about '31-'32 the Alfred Dolge Hose Co. got up a basketball team. They had everythin' ceptin' a coach, so they says to Bernie, would you consider a coachin' us? There be a lot of teams around here which is all fired up to beat us, and we want to put thet fire out. "Sure", says Bernie, "We'll hose them right off the court." I got to be manager which was a fancy name for bookin' games, and arrangin' rides. Bernie did a right good job. Don't recollect the figures but wound up the season a winnin' more then a losin'. I got to tell you about the night we played a team in Old Forge, "The Lumberjacks", which is what they called themselves. We hired a 7 passenger taxi for the team and Bernie and me went in my Model A Ford coupe. 25 below zero when we left Dolgeville around 5 in the afternoon. Say, we cut down them "Lumber Jacks" jest like they cut down trees. But whilest we was doin' thet, the weather man was a cuttin' down on the temperature. We mighta been warm afore we come outdoors, but thet thermometer was a

teeterin' twixt 40 and 45 below. We agreed to stick together in case of trouble. But Georgethet was George Service whose taxi we had, started out ahead. We got held back for a minute, and George must have had his eye and mind on a gettin' home, 'cause we never did see him again. We were lucky, no trouble, but just as we drove in my driveway the lights went out and the car guit right there. Quit cold you might say. Battery went dead. In them days, you see, cars didn't have heaters, and to keep the frost off the windshield the defroster was a few wires enclosed in a glass "cage" 'bout 1 foot by 6 or 8 inches. Fairly effective, but current users, and we had had it on the whole trip, and along with the lights it had been too much. About the heat- we did get some off the manifold, but the old overcoat felt mighty comfortable. Bernie and me was both tired and it seems the battery was too. I hope Bernie don't get too displeased with this, but you know we like to froze to death that night, and when ever I see Bernie, thet night pops to

Thet next to last camp on the West Lake side of Dolgeville Point, the one with the flag stone fire place, we owned once, and you know the story back of thet fire place - let me tell you. Them flag stones come from my grandfathers grist mill in Salisbury Ct'r. They was hauled from the creekside to the road by horses and stone boat. Whut's a stone boat? Well, they was planks nailed together and about 3 foot wide, with a slight curve on one end so they wouldn't drag into the ground. Unloaded frum the stone boat to the truck, hauled by truck to the Canada Lake boat house, dumped, loaded on to "Skeet" Sliters barge, taken to the shore by the camp, unloaded andwheeled up to the spot of the fire place, and there put up by a Dolgeville mason. He only did it as a favor to me as he was water shy, and always covered his eyes on the trip over and back. On the room side of the fire place he placed a large arrow shaped stone. Yep, we got caught out on West Lake in the fog one night. Circled round and round, gettin nowhere until we thought about callin our dog "Gypper". He come to the rescue by runnin up and down the shore a barkin' his head off. Instead of a fog horn we had a barkin' dog. Winters was great fun. We'd get the ole fire place a roarin and put out 2 or 3 tip ups, and put up the poker table. Course we'd keep one eye on the tip ups, and draw cards to see who would go out. Out of the six players no one had to go many times.

Most everybody around knew "Skeet" Sliter and where he lived on the point. He was almost as much a part of the lake as the lake itself. He was a Dolgeville boy, and well known for his friendliness, ready wit and someone you would like to have with you in an emergency. Kind of a cut-up, he was too. Years ago, close to 60 probably, unbeknownst to his father he took up flying lessons. One afternoon, folks around town, hearin' a plane circlin' looked up - that was somethin' you didn't see much of, especially that low down and doin' all that swoopin' and fancy stuff. By and by he begun to sort of close in and circle 'round in one place. Who do you suppose it was? Yes sir, it was "Skeet" goin' around the fire place chimney on his fathers house.

One time when there was a water shortage folks next door ran out of water. They got kind of mystified since they both used the same well and they saw Marie washin' dishes. Bein' curious people they asked "Skeet" how come? Well it seems they had been away and water in the well was runnin' low, so "Skeet", the ole cut up, put an extra piece on his line. The problem was solved. The neighbors put an extra length of pipe on their line and all was even. They was good neighbors after that. Most everyone knew "Skeet" and Marie friendly and sociable, and in times of trouble it was, call "Skeet". When they reached the age and found boating between their house and the mainland in summer, and walkin' the ice in winter had gotten to be work and not fun, they sold their property and bought the store. Wern't long when they sold that and moved to Florida. They both died in Florida 10 years ago.

You might say that mother nature has more wind than I do - sounds like she out lasted my story tellin', fire is a gettin' low too, so we'll just put a couple of chunks in the stove, cut down the draft and all get a good nights sleep.

THE LEVEL OF FASCINATION

Canada Lake is located in the southwestern tier of a six-million acre expanse of wilderness, the Adirondack Park. The lake is about five miles long, with a depth of 180 feet. It is connected to two other lakes, West Lake and Green Lake. At one end of Canada Lake is a very long, narrow three-mile outlet with beautiful scenery similiar to a stream in the Canadian Northwest; bare trees and marshy shores line the outlet, while lillypads dot the water. On the opposite there is a much wider waterway, but before long it leads to a dead end.

In the middle of the lake, near one of its points and area of greatest depth, is a single island about the size of a house, having a few trees and a cluster of rocks. It is named after the legendary Revolutionary War hero Nick Stoner. Off of another point parallel to the island is a small cove. At the end of the cove is our lakehouse, an aerly twentieth- century house built in the style of an Adirondack camp. It is situated on over an acre of land at the base of Sheely Mountain. A great number of deer and bear inhabit the mountain, and I was surprised to learn that they were so near. Of course, I have often seen deer on the road going around the lake, but I was very interested to learn of bear so nearby.

Another landmark on the north shore is Kane Mountain. On the top there is an observation tower used to spot fires by local park rangers and is opened to the public a few days a week. Having climbed the tower on a clear, sunny day, you can survey the beauty of Canada Lake and its beautiful surroundings and can see the distant Mohawk River Valley. While looking at it all, you get the sensation you're in a glider overlooking the world with nothing stopping you, and that you can touch each of these places with a sweep of the hand.

Another feature to this glorious expanse of wilderness is not a landmark at all, but just a feeling of being free. This feeling comes alive around mid-afternoon while leisurely strolling on the dirt road encircling half the lake. At that time, the sun just filters through the foilage and makes you wonder whether the experience is just a dream of peacefully walking through these majestic woods with all your irksome tasks completed, or realizing you're actually there looking at the simple but wondrous spectacle.
