

BOATING REGULATIONS

- Always ski with a spotter in the boat who is at least 10 years old
- Ski during daylight hours
- Maintain speed at or below 5 mph within 100' of shore, docks, skiers and swimmers, unless you are dropping off or picking up a skier
- Utilize navigation lights after sunset
- Provide an approved life jacket for everyone aboard the craft
- · Vests must be worn by all children under 12
- A throwable life preserving device must be present in the boat
- Do not operate a craft while impaired by any drug or alcoholic beverage
- · Engines on all crafts must be reasonably muffled
- Operators are responsible for any damage caused by their wakes
- Minimum age to operate a power boat is 10
- Age 10 to 18 must complete a safe boating course to operate a power boat without adult supervision
- The minimum age for operating a PWC is 14
- "Everyone" must complete a safe boating course to operate a Personal Water Craft.



CLPA President's Message

If you are like me, and are just reading this message upon receiving your long awaited 2013 Echo in the mail, you probably have the wonderful once a year realization that summer is actually, really, seriously, finally here! Whether you are facing your spring chores or have already enjoined the beautiful early spring weather, we hope you had a healthy and productive winter and are ready for some fun and relaxation at our common Shangri-La in the Adirondacks known as Canada Lake.

As always, the key to fair taxation in communities like Canada Lake are community participation and representation in the political process (a.k.a. local voting, service on the town board, the board of assessment review, etc.). Just one local vote per property on Canada Lake and

the other local lakes in the town of Caroga could have a huge impact on issues such as commitments to water quality, fair taxation etc. All it takes is the submission of a change in voting jurisdiction form which I can provide upon request or can be obtained at the Town Clerk's office.

As you renew your CLPA membership, please note the additional opportunities to donate toward your favorite CLPA programs. You will note a new category this year for contributions toward a professional fireworks show during our 4th of July celebration. This effort was inspired by the disappointment expressed by members about the lack of fireworks last year, and concern over involving the CLPA in any informal fireworks display. The Franz family experienced the tragic and untimely loss of a family member and longtime Canada Lake resident Kimberly Franz who passed away in January after a long battle with Cancer. Her favorite day of the summer was always 4th of July, which was also her birthday, and she was an especially avid fan of our traditional informal fireworks display. This year, to kick off this new fundraising effort, we would like to dedicate the display to Kimberly's memory, and will publish a list of contributors in next year's Echo. Adopt-a-Shoreline and Shoreline Clean Up

The 2012 Shoreline cleanup was conducted in late August. The many Adopt-a-Shoreline volunteers and lake residents who were active all summer made this a very brief but productive day. It is extremely rewarding to see so many people all with the same passion for Canada Lake. Thank you everyone for all the effort.

Adopt-a-Shoreline is a concept in its third year on Canada Lake. The way it works is most lake front owners keep their own shorelines clean. The remaining shoreline belongs to the state, is undeveloped, or neglected. It is these waterfronts that can be adopted, and it is these shorelines that we concentrate on during the yearly cleanup.

This winter was a little longer than in the past. Ice out and the snowmelt was much later. Winter damage increased late in the season as conditions became harsher. This may result in more spring clean up than normal. The ice level fluctuated during the winter, so it remains to be seen what debris ice out will leave behind.

If you are interested in being a part of this, you can get involved by becoming a committee member, or contacting any CLPA director, Warren Roosevelt, or myself. All Adopt—a-Shoreline volunteers are contacted by email or telephone early in the summer and late in the fall. The discussion usually revolves around the shoreline each volunteer wishes to clean, so there is no duplication of effort. Every volunteer is then on their own, the effort spent is up to the individual. Later in the summer the clean up day is organized.

Fishing Report

Thank you to all who have contributed to the rainbow trout fish stocking program which I started some three plus years ago. Fish were initially stocked at about the 9 inch range. Trout that were stocked over three years ago have grown to the 20 inch plus range. They are doing well just feeding on the abundance of shiners or fall fish. This program has been a great success, and again I thank you!

There is nothing more fun than bringing a 20 inch rainbow trout home for dinner. Our lakes (Canada, West and Green lake) are some of the cleanest in our area, staying free of unwanted vegetation such as milfoil. Our own CLPA team tests our waters at least twice a year to monitor any possible infiltration of chemicals or septic leaching. Small mouth bass, and all pan fish are doing very well, while large mouth bass are declining slightly, for reasons unknown.

If you really want to have some fun, take a child fishing and enjoy the excitement in there voice when they say "I got one dad" or "grandpa I got another one". Fishing is one of the most therapeutic sports today. If you have not fished in a few years, give it ago and enjoy it, I know I have. Hope to see you out on our lakes soon.

Environment and Ecology Report

The CLPA Environment and Ecology Committee held two meetings - on July 28th and August 25th of 2012. Two key take-aways from our meetings were:

- 1. There is a wealth of useful information already available on issues of interest including nuisance geese, terrestrial aquatic invasive plants, and light pollution.
- 2. The CLPA website provides a simple and logical focal point for collecting and sharing access to helpful information (such as how to dissuade geese, or where to find low-impact outdoor lighting).

Thanks to all committee members for the progress we have made on collecting and sharing information as well as finding useful website links. Particular thanks go to Merryn Byrnes and Allen Farber for making this information accessible on the CLPA website. If you've not already done so, I recommend you check out the "lake issues" tab in the CLPA website and pick a topic of interest to you. See http://canadalake.mylaketown.com/

There is more we can do, and there are other topics we can review further (e.g. noise) when we reconvene in 2013, but we're off to a solid start.

Water Level Report

The Water Level Committee is preparing a working model of water level fluctuations in the Canada Lake watershed.

Water level data recorded from Green Lake Bridge and at Stewarts Landing; rainfall amounts collected from a rain gauge at the Canada Lake Store; and Dam Operation records from the DEC are currently being evaluated to help develop this model.

This model will help the CLPA and DEC understand how much the water level of Canada Lake changes due to rainfall amount and the position of the gate at the dam. This model will be available to view on the CLPA website ('Water Level' page under the 'Lake Issues' tab) in the coming months.

Invasive Species Report

PROTECTING THE CANADA LAKES FROM INVASIVE PLANTS AND ANIMALS IS EVERYONE'S RESPONSIBILITY!

Boats used on other bodies of water should be cleaned upon removal and <u>before</u> launch on the Canada Lakes.

We hope to meet and instruct every boater using the West Lake Boat Launch with the ultimate goal of inspecting every boat launched.

In the summer of 2012, eighteen Lake Stewards (two paid, sixteen volunteer) inspected 765 boats at the West Lake Boat Launch. This was a 50% increase over the number of boats inspected in 2011! Of those inspected, 130 had been on bodies of water infested with one or more invasive plants and/or animals within the previous two week period. Vegetation was removed from 97 of those boats and placed in the launch site's drop box.

Last year the launch site was manned on weekends during June, the entire week of July 4th, and every day but Mondays during the remainder of July. In August, there was coverage every day but Mondays and Tuesdays of the first two weeks of the month, and coverage on Wednesdays, Fridays and the weekends for the balance of the summer

If you are interested in becoming a Volunteer Lake Steward, please contact Michael Durkee durkeeml@hotmail.com. Volunteer Lake Stewards serve two, 3-4 hour shifts, at the boat launch each summer. A half-day training session is held during the last week of June.

Last August, twenty-one volunteer Lake Inspectors searched the Inlet and over 80% of the shallow margins of our lakes. They found no invasive plants. (See http://canadalake.mylaketown.com/invasive for further details). More Lake Inspectors are needed to cover all of our lakes. If you would like to become a volunteer Lake Inspector and spend about two hours inspecting a portion of our lakes, please contact Mark Harazin amichalek@capitalcardiology.com. A half-day training session is held during the last week of June.

Every year more Adirondack lakes become homes for invasive plants or animals. The Canada Lakes are not yet infested but if invasive species are introduced, we want to quickly discover them and take action.

We are grateful for the financial support from the Town of Caroga, the CLPA and its individual members. Individual member contributions were used last year to purchase t-shirts and sweatshirts for Lake Stewards, invasive species manuals for Lake Inspectors, and a tent to protect our Lake Stewards from the sun (see http://canadalake.mylaketown.com/invasive).

- All persons under 12 years of age must be wearing their PFD.
- One throwable device must also be on board.

Garbage Pickup - Tuesdays

Garbage to be curbside by 6 a.m. on day of collection in clear plastic bags.

Do not include any recyclables, or yard debris.

Residents are encouraged to place garbage in a trash can with handle locks to keep away animals - up to 20 gallons in size.

Paint cans without lids may be placed in a separate plastic bag curbside if they are empty and dry.


Another new spin on the art of t-shirt creation was held on Canada Lake at the Silvernail-Wood camp. Each child made a beautiful loon inspired shirt


(and even a few adults!).

A dozen kids took part in the Kane Mountain Climb. before we hiked, each made hiking sticks for the walk, with a little help from the adults that hiked with us.







By attending Mercury School annually in March, Howard and Chris are keeping current on the technology for



I grew up in Gloversville, but currently live in Raleigh, North Carolina. When my friends back in North Carolina asked me where I was going for six weeks this summer, I told them that my husband Ron and I were going to rent a camp on a lake in the Adirondacks, in New York State.

For most people when they hear New York, they think of New York City with its tall skyscrapers, millions of people and congestion. But New York is a large state with some amazingly beautiful

Planning for Emergencies Adirondack Style

Life on Canada Lake is wonderful during our seasons of spring, summer, fall and winter. One thing we rarely think about is emergencies, weather related and otherwise. However all of our residents have been impacted by severe storms, hurricane like winds and torrential rains in the past few years, with flooding becoming an ever more serious event. In any of these situations, our homes and businesses can easily loose power, and may be without basic services for days on end. Thankfully, due to past storms, many homes have been raised or renovated to prevent flooding damage.

Here are some lessons we learned during our past experiences with Hurricane Sandy, and other weather related challenges:

- Have a weather radio handy. They are really good for anticipating storms and weather events; however you can expect alerts at all hours including the wee hours of the morning!
- Call your power company, National Grid, for urgent updates and to report outages (1-800-867 5222).
- Move any vehicles from flood prone/ low lying areas before the storm starts, good thing our neighbors reminded us of this one!
- Line up supplies such as medications, paper goods, flashlights, battery chargers, hand cleaner, firewood, bottled water and a battery charger.
- Fill buckets with water for flushing toilets and for bathing.
- Use inexpensive plastic garbage cans filled with water or rocks to weigh down the docks to try and keep them from floating away.

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- Secure your boats and docks. We moved our boats off the docks and anchored them fore and aft. You could also pull your boats out of the water to keep them from taking off down the lake. After every storm there are remnants of docks and boat parts floating which present a hazard.
- Secure canoes, kayaks and John Boats out of water and away from trees if possible.
- Put away lawn furniture and flags which might blow away or become flying objects.
- Some residents have barricaded windows with plywood or shutters prior to severe storms.
- Your barbecue can be used for cooking in an emergency without power and a butane cooker or camp stove works outdoors. Please be careful about any fuel burning equipment such as kerosene or propane and make sure no fumes accumulate in your home.
- Most importantly, your hard wired phone will not work without power or if the lines are down. Cell phones are intermittent, and your computer will not last long without the wireless internet service. Be prepared to either wait it out or depart well in advance

of the storm as local roads may not be passable. One year the NY State Thruway was even closed down. Don't drive during this critical period if you can avoid traveling.

• Have emergency numbers handy. If you can still use phones let your family and neighbors know you are ok. We have wonderful people in our community who have gone above and beyond to help out in an emergency, but it is always great to be well prepared!

Winged Jewels Over Čanada Lake


The seasons spent at Canada Lake are so varied especially with regard to the wildlife we can observe in our air, waters and the land based animals Sometimes I am surprised at how very few mammals I see during the spring, summer and fall. Rarely are deer or bear spotted, more likely emerging during late fall and winter. Once in a while a fantastic bird, and in some years even bald eagles, make their temporary home in the skies. Loons, while few in number, are there through the season and only departing as the winter nears.

However, there are amazing creatures to observe right in front of our eyes during the summer months; dragonflies, damselflies, and a wonderful migration of monarch butterflies in the fall! You can spot these insects on land and over water in an ever changing assortment of colors. For the monarchs there is a slow but steady migration to Mexico for the winter months. Keeping these insects present in our environment is another important reason to maintain the quality of our lakes and shorelines and preserve the plants that are necessary for survival, like the milkweed.

Dragonflies and Damselflies

New York has an amazing variety of odonates, the word for damsels and dragons (Order "Odonata"), estimated to be 193 in total with 59 damselfly species in our state. How to tell the difference? Dragonflies hold their two pairs of transparent wings open, flat and horizontally at rest, have huge eyes on either side of the head and can reach speeds of up to 30mph. Typically they are 2-4 inches in length and have heavier bodies, frequently zooming high up into the air. Damselflies are 1-2 inches in length, hold their wings over their backs either closed or in a V shape, have

slender bodies and usually stay close to the ground. Colors are amazing with blue, green, iridescent, and every design in the rainbow.

Having an encounter with one of these gentle creatures is exciting, and they help us at the lake with their valuable consumption of large numbers of mosquitoes, black flies, horseflies and deer flies! What better friend could you have than these roving predators as they patrol across the lakes and marshes! If vou allow vourself to let one land on vou, consider yourself lucky. It tickles because of the tiny barbs on their feet, but don't worry, they neither sting nor bite. These insects have been on our earth for over 200 million years, before the age of the dinosaurs.

Our lakes and ponds are very important to sustain these magnificent aerial hunters who deposit their eggs in or near water and vegetation. The eggs hatch into larvae and then newly hatched larvae (nymphs) develop through multiple stages, finally emerging as adults. These adults only fly for a single warm season, from one to three months, so enjoy this brief encounter. For the dragonfly and damselfly this is enough to ensure the next generation. If we care for our lakes, we will see many more generations to come. Below are some references to help you recognize and learn more about these shimmering jewels.

FANTASTIC FACTS!

- Dragonfly larvae have jet propulsion under water
- Dragonflies mate at a "rendezvous" and fly in tandem, looking heart shaped
- Dragonflies can fly forward, backward, up, down and hover, with wings acting like an airplane propeller
- · Dragonflies have the best vision in the insect world, with 30,000 simple eves. Try to catch one!

Monarch Butterflies

Have you seen singles and groups of the bright orange and black monarch butterfly crossing the lakes and flying against the wind to begin their annual migration south to Mexico? In some years, they have been seen by the hundreds crossing the roadways and unfortunately some are killed by vehicles. By far the greatest threat is the loss of habitat. Our plain, simple milkweed plant is their only source of survival because they lay their eggs on this plant, which is sometimes considered a weed and mowed or treated with pesticides.

The Monarch, "Danaus plexippus" butterfly has stained glass wings with a 3-5 inch span. These are the only butterflies that we know migrate in the fall and head to Mexico to overwinter in the oyamel mountain forests where millions congregate until the following March. In January 2002, 500 million monarchs were wiped out by a winter storm. With the average migration at 3 billion for the season, this was a tremendous loss. Please take a look at your local milkweed plants, and you may see the following life cycle of the monarch;

The **Egg**-an adult butterfly lays 400-600 eggs, one at a time on the milkweed plant, usually on the underside of the leaf, and they hatch in 3-5 days.

The Caterpillar - so small it could drown in a raindrop, when it emerges, it eats the egg case (good protein) and then the leaves of the milkweed. This is the first instar or stage in the five transformations to become a butterfly. After a "walkabout" the tiny caterpillar crawls under a leaf or twig of the milkweed and will shed its skin five times before becoming a pupa. In two weeks, it will become about 2

inches long and 3,000 times its original weight. Eat, eat, eat those milkweed leaves and gain the protective toxin!

The Chrysalis (Pupa) stage - a tiny silk button is spun and attached to a sheltered surface, where the pupa hangs upside down in a "J" shape. In 24 hours, it splits its skin and wriggles out, revealing a green pupa case (chrysalis) which hardens and develops a pattern of gold dots. Inside a butterfly is transforming over a 10-14 day period, revealing a monarch butterfly inside.



The **Butterfly** emerges from its chrysalis during the morning, when it splits and the butterfly pulls itself out and hangs upside down to dry its wings. From then on, it feeds on flower nectar and has completed a unique metamorphosis and transformation, living about six weeks throughout the summer months.

The **Migration**- while adult butterflies have only a brief life in the summer the eggs that they lay in late summer are different. When a butterfly emerges, they do not mate and lay eggs right away. Their job is to fly 2,000 miles to Mexico where they will overwinter, living a total of about 8 months. Monarchs may travel as much as 80 miles a day, using the sun as a compass. When you spot them flying in September and early October, please send them off with a wish to survive the journey because they have never been there before, and many never make the crossing.

Winged Jewels Over Canada Lake

If they survive, they will mate in March and begin to migrate north, reaching the Gulf States like Texas where they lay their eggs on the next generation of milkweed and die. Now we understand why the milkweed is so important to the Monarch Butterfly!

FASCINATING FACTS!

- The milkweed plant contains powerful toxins in the white, sticky sap called cardiac glycosides, which protect the monarch from being eaten by predators. These toxins are used to treat congestive heart failure and arterial disease
- A "community" of insects live on the milkweed plant, which plays host to aphids, bugs, beetles, caterpillars, fly larvae, weevils, spiders, moths and others, all of which sustain each other through the milkweed
- Monarchs fly over 2,500 miles to reach their overwintering site in Mexico from Canada and the eastern US

Last summer I purchased several milkweed plants and found that monarch caterpillars were emerging. Feel free to purchase some milkweed plants and watch the action. Also, please do not destroy any milkweed patch on your property. Look for large plants four feet in height with five leaves above and five below. You will notice the sticky latex substance and later in the fall the pods break open with new seeds. Collect them and plant for a new generation of monarch butterflies.

This was originally published by Tony in the 'Caroga Times'online newsletter, September 2007. I have changed a few things..... Judi B. Dunn. April 16, 2013

When June rolled around back in 1954 and years after, it meant to me not only was school about to be mercifully ended, but that we would begin to go to Canada Lake again to open up the camp for the season! It was hard to focus on end of school exams because all I could think of was how much fun it would be to see all of my friends from New York, New Jersey, Long Island and points south. Those summers from 1954 till into the 60's and beyond were spent at our camp on Dolgeville point, on Canada lake.

The 'lake gang', circa 1957, are still in existence, minus a few departed members who have gone on before us. They are revving up the ski boats in the wild blue yonder... waiting for us to join them!

As a pre-teen we used to entertain ourselves with swimming, sleepovers. popcorn and pizza parties, late movies and learning to perfect our technique on the slalom and look cool! To not be able to ski was to not live on Canada Lake. We loved to ski under the bridge on Kasson drive into Green Lake and take a spin around and shoot through the underpass again! Shopping in Gloversville at the factories was a happy past time as well. At the end of summer we always went to buy wool there, as my mom was into making 'ponchos' for a few years. The leather factories were another stop for gloves and beautiful suede coats! As a young kid, going to Sherman's on Saturday night was something we all looked forward to each weekend. I remember the monkey, the best cotton candy in the universe and the soft ice cream. A vision any dentist would embrace for future patients! The tilt-a-whirl was one of my favorites and we could scream as loud as we wanted and no one cared, as we spun off at an alarming angle and then jolted

in reverse! The 'bumper' cars were a highlight of the park and the harder you slammed someone the better it was. I guess we could release our tension atavistic tendencies there. Day or night, when we stopped on top of the ferries wheel and looked out over Caroga Lake, it was a special moment and everyone loved that.

Time marches on and as a teenager we would spend our days water skiing, boating, sailing, playing cards (poker and pitch being some of our favorites), smoking and sneaking beers from our parents supply. We would 'gas up' at Skeet Sliters' lakeside store, buy a ton of chips to fortify us for the sun filled, lazy afternoon and take off for the Steubers dock to enjoy another hedonistic, vice filled time with my friends. Dick Evans. R.I.P., would always charge several sixpacks to his dad's bill and we would have icy cold beer to cool us down for serious pitch or poker marathons! On the weekends, we would all go 'en masse' in several cars first to Pine Lake to dance for a while, then move on to Caroga to do some serious square dancing in the pavilion to live music! The rides and the midway beckoned during 'breaks' from too many do-si-dos! No matter what one's age the rides were always so much fun. The view from the top of the Ferris wheel is only a moment away when I close my eyes.... and the smell of the popcorn popping away in the big glass enclosure. If one was stopped on top, the scene of the twinkling camp lights around the lake was like a diamond necklace on a shimmering black satin dress.

When you looked down on the entire amusement park area it seemed as though you were high above a lighted jewel box! Everything looked so big back back then....

I loved riding an outside horse on the carousel in hope of catching the brass ring, just once or twice. The bumper car ride never seemed long enough to get revenge on the "pre- Nascar guys" who took great delight in ramming into you with an evil grimace on their faces! On a recent visit, I spied a rusted hulk of a bumper car, and it brought tears to my eyes. Just think, long before Pac Man, Super Mario, Atari and game apps there were pin ball machines with their lights, bells, whistles and flippers! Ah... the wonderful days at the lake and fun filled nights at Caroga.

Later on, when we were of legal drinking age, and maybe a bit before....we were the regulars at Pine Lake Lodge (known as Torey's), Lake Aire, Vroomans, Christmas Tree, Sno-Drift, and the 19th hole (not necessarily in that order!) Here the gang spent many happy hours with a current beau, or not, just playing shuffleboard and dancing up a storm to the jukeboxes or band if there was one that night. It was 'bar hopping' at its best! We would often close the Sno-Drift or 19th hole and then I would carefully drive to the boathouse, to navigate the boat to the point. Skeet used to leave his light on for me, which many a night I needed as a guide in the fog! If I forgot to close the automatic bailer when I tied up the boat, there was hell to pay the next morning from my father! Ah, drinking, the cause of many a mistake....Often, we would take early morning hikes up Kane Mountain to the fire tower, climb up and have a panoramic view of the Adirondacks. This was always breathtaking and made you realize how big the area was. We would catch up on lake gossip on Skeet's store steps and enjoy a cold coke from a bottle!

As a young teenager, I spent many 'camping out' nights along the banks of Lily Lake, with Jane and Nancy Petrie and Karin Menge telling ghost stories complete with an 'Indian raid' by the various guys on the lake. It was a chance

to smoke up a storm with Lucky Strikes or Camels, pinched from our father's packs, and enjoys a few beers (did dad ever miss these brews?) We also used to love to go to the island and just hang out....I cannot think now what was so special, just another point of viewing the lake maybe and you kind of felt like it was all yours alone.

My parents, the Bachman's, used to host clambakes at our camp for people on the point and other guests from the lake. Doc Buckbee, and Norma and Bill Menge. Before the event were busy times filled with preparation for the 'bake'. This operation entailed the logistics of 'barging' to the point all the large cookers needed for the steaming of clams, corn, chickens, lobsters and whatever else they wanted to throw in! All that came contributed with the addition of all manner of salads, side dishes, fruit and desserts, and beverages of every ilk. This was truly 'a moveable feast'. It began about 10 am and lasted all day and after our 'homage's' to the sunset that evening many would gather until well past midnight around a huge campfire down near the lake. My dad would grouse throughout the day, with regard to the ability of our septic tank to hold up with all the heavy use! Thank heavens; somehow, it always made it through the day! Phew! And often newuuu!

I remember what great fun we had skiing down Lily Lake four abreast behind John Castilloux's incredible 'cigarette boat', thinking we were nearly ready for cypress gardens' ski show! The 'ski cult' was so much a part of our daily life. Even though our parents belonged to the Nick Stoner golf club, many early Saturday and Sunday mornings we (Jane, Marty Gohn, some of the Rhors) would sneak on Nick Stoner's back nine and enjoy a round of golf without paying! It was probably more about the 'sneaking on' and not getting caught than the game. Imagine, we thought we

were so cool.... Our lake gang consisted of myself, the Rhors, Healeys, Evans, Steubers, Yeungers, T.Willard, Gohns, Franz, Menge, Johnny Miller and the Libertis and Joe Aulisi on occasion. What a crew, and we took up five or six tables wherever we went! We were dancing fools all weekend long!

When I married and lived in NYC we would bring our daughter Erin to the lake where she was able to learn to sail and played with my friends children. Living only 5 hours away, I was able to keep up with my 'lake gang' and their families for many years. When my father passed away, my brother. Butch Bachman (Bachy) took over the camp and spent many happy years with his companion Lois Miller. After he died in a tragic accident in 1990, the camp passed to Lois. She has been very kind and invited us back many times to enjoy the camp, lake activities and old friends. Often we would drive to Caroga to show my daughter Sherman's and to buy an ice cream. I loved walking around and remembering the good times... I can close my eyes now and hear the music of the calliope as I go round and round with my out stretched arm hoping to catch the brass ring just one more time.... like Dorothy said... 'there's no place like home' and no place on earth like the beautiful Adirondack mountains and the lakes.


Back in NYS, she continues to take dance lessons from Peggy DeLay in Saratoga, as well as being the person in charge at the Lakeside Motel!

"These two supports had to be replaced this year because of settling. The rest are in excellent condition.



joined them in his newly restored Lyman. The three of them created their own private boat parade around the lake, shifting the lead from one boat to the next. It was a wonderful sight providing memories for many. Only four days later, Dave passed away.

Canada Lake embodied all of the things which Dave loved most. Throughout his life, he spent most of each summer here. As he grew older, he expanded that time span into late fall, then early spring, and finally to include winter as well! In his mind, Canada Lake was the BEST place to be. The first Fisher camp was known as Kon Tiki, on Kasson Drive. By middle school, his parents purchased the camp now known as Fisher's Folly, on South Shore Rd. Fisher's Folly (aptly named by Dave) allowed his parents (Drena and Allen) to share their camp with their grandchildren (Dave's daughter- Katie. and Linda's children- Alison and Steve). It was a place to relax, work on projects, enjoy boating, water ski by the hour, and appreciate others. As children grew up and families grew, quarters became increasingly cozy at the camp. Dave and family migrated down South Shore Rd. to the Lake House.

It is hard to pin point what Dave most loved about the lake. Water was theme which ran through his life. He enjoyed the water greatly. Whether it was the redirection of water which was eroding the hillside in a heavy rain, the annual task of connecting well water, skiing out to the island in winter, checking on the ice fishing in front of the camp, or going to Caroga Lake for the winter Ice Car Races... if something involved water, it was bound to be good. He spent several summers mastering how to both start and stop water skiing from atop the dock, never becoming wet above the ankle from a fast ski around the lake.

He adored boats! Motor boats- which might go fast and pull skiers; antique wooden boats- which required care, attention, and adoration by the hour. Yet these boats were fully appreciated as he daily sought the perfect sunset (waiting to see the proverbial "green flash" right as the sun goes below the horizon), or cruised with another wooden boat; sailing; and water-skiing. The cruises varied in their velocity, sometimes they were zippy (racing to see the sunset), others leisurely (enjoying the scenery), and vet others were glacial (waiting to be towed in after running out of gas...again). He began taking his boats to antique wooden boat shows. He was deservedly very proud of the family 1939 Chris Craft which first had been his father's. Ultimately, his fleet also included his boyhood Thompson runabout, a 1932 Garwood, and a 1966 Lyman as well as a restored very early Old Town canoe. There were other boats both small (The Miss Peggy) and large (Nevermore) that 'floated' in and out of his fleet. Most days there just was not enough time to enjoy all of these!



The people of the lake were essential to him. What a wonderful variety of people there are to get to know. Even a quick trip to the post office or the store resulted in our hearing about someone Dave had met on his journey. Yes, they might stop by sometime soon for a boat ride, and yes, they already had been invited to Canadian Thanksgiving. It mattered not at all what type of occupation the person was involved in, nor their age; they were a

together again next year". The next day Dave delighted in counting just how many people had been able to attend that special year. He loved it!

As Dave looks down upon us, let's continue in his tradition of enjoying each day at the lake to its fullest. As families and friends gather, and boats pull skiers and admire sunsets (sometimes illicitly done simultaneously) know that your enjoyment of the lake was the foundation of Dave's. We will cherish the memories and continue to celebrate each day at the lake in honor of Dave.

Norris "Bud" Osborn

Norris "Bud" Osborn died on January 23, 2013 at the age of 94 in Niskayuna, NY. He had been a summer resident of Canada Lake's south shore since the 1940's.

Bud's sense of adventure and love for Canada Lake and the outdoors touched many people throughout his life. Some of his happiest times were spent on mountaintops and trails in the Adirondacks, on the Long Trail, on parts of the Appalachian Trail, on Mt. Orizaba in Mexico and, at age 74, trekking in the Himalayas.

Bud is survived by his wife June, three children and their respective spouses: Dorothy (Raymond), Minott (Meredith) and Christopher (Tracey); five grandchildren: Tricia, Allison, Brooke, Georgia and Edith; and many nieces, nephews, cousins and friends.

In 1931, Bud was introduced to Canada Lake while visiting Mabel and Kenneth Widdemer on the north shore. After graduating from Yale University in 1940, he served in the Army Air Corps with tours of duty in Egypt, India and Bahrain. During that time, two lots became available on the south shore of Canada Lake. A deal was negotiated and Bud began paying for the lots through an allotment of his Army pay.

After the war, he was able to acquire an adjacent lot plus a cottage, which he later sold to purchase a home in Florida.

While working at a Philadelphia investment company, Bud saw an advertisement for the sale of army barracks being dismantled at Camp Croft in South Carolina. He ordered a 40-foot section. An 18-wheeler delivered the structure to Canada Lake and "Skeet" Sliter's barge transported it to the south shore. In 1949, with the help of his brother Louis and many wonderful neighbors, Bud assembled the 20- by 40-foot building.

Bud moved to south Florida in the 1950's, returning every summer with his family to enjoy Canada Lake and to work on the barracks that, in time, became known as the "ark." Friends donated various doors and windows over the years - adding to the camp's character. In 1973, builder Bob Wilbur was hired to construct a 400-square-foot cottage next to the barracks, and the "ark" was relegated to the children.

Bud believed in community involvement and was an active member of the Lion's Club and Unitarian churches in Boca Raton, Florida and Schenectady, New York. He started a Habitat for Humanity chapter in Deerfield Beach, Florida, and served on the city's Planning and Zoning Board. In 1962 he served as president of the Canada Lakes Protective Association.

After retiring from Florida Atlantic University, Bud and June travelled the world with friends and Elderhostel groups. Eleven years ago, they moved to the Glen Eddy community in Niskayuna to be closer to the people and place they had grown to cherish.

The family wishes that Bud be remembered during walks and hikes or in quiet moments of contemplation. These things would honor his memory and his love of beauty, humor, nature and knowledge.

PERSONAL WATERCRAFT

- Each person on or being towed must wear a life jacket (PFD).
- The PWC must have a USCG approved backfire flame arrestor.
- If so equipped, the engine cutoff lanyard must be used.
- No operation between sunset and sunrise.
- No PWC may be operated within 500 ft. of a designated swimming area except when launching and then 10 MPH (straight out).
- Safety equipment such as a distress signal or horn must be on board.
- New York State Law prohibits: weaving in and out of traffic intentional last minute swerving except to avoid collision wave jumping
- Anyone operating a PWC in New York State must complete a safe boating course.
- The minimum age for operating a PWC is 14.



Safe Boating Course

Offered on June 29th or July 13th at Caroga Town Hall from 8am to 5pm. Call 518-835-4211 ext. 21 to register. Class size is limited. New York State law requires people between the ages of 10 and 18 to earn a safe boater's certificate in order to operate a boat alone and anyone who wishes to operate a Personal Water Craft.
